The voluntary sector in Wales offers several opportunities;


As a place to receive a service, access learning or have an experience

28% of adults volunteer either formally or informally in Wales

In 2017/18, 23% of young people aged 11-16 had volunteered

22% males / 24% females

Vast range of types, places and approaches to volunteering



Voluntary sector as 'a place to volunteer' for children and young people





Popular reasons for young people to volunteer are 'to help the community', 'to help them to get into uni/college/job' and 'to make a difference'

Opportunities for children and young people to volunteer are growing — there are valuable 'encounters' and 'experiences' available

The new curriculum offers opportunities to bring education and the community together

For changing priorities


For semi / full retirement

The voluntary sector workforce has grown by 11% since 2010
