
Students don't have to set up their own business to make use of their enterprise skills; many employers look out for graduate recruits with these qualities.

Enterprise is embedded within the curriculum through:

- Incorporating activities that develop relevant skills
- Enterprise education is characterised by 'learning by doing', problem solving, and collaboration
- Often uses employers or other externals for real-world challenges in the curriculum

Enterprise is also offered as an extra curricular option though:

- Open Challenges
- Competitions
- Student led Societies such as Enactus



Nurturing Entrepreneurs

Entrepreneurship in the curriculum:

- Some courses particularly in Creative industries embed entrepreneurship into the curriculum as part of professional practice.
- Stand alone Entrepreneurship Courses and optional modules
- Enterprise placement options

Entrepreneurship outside the curriculum:

- 1-2-1 support and mentoring
- Workshops, masterclasses, guest entrepreneurs
- Funding
- Space to develop and start businesses
- Networking opportunities

"To develop and nurture self-sufficient, entrepreneurial young people in all communities in Wales, who will contribute positively to economic and social success"


- 1. Engaging: Promote the value of entrepreneurship; develop awareness and raise aspiration

What is an Enterprising Mindset?

Becoming:

- Self-aware of personality and social identity
- Motivated to achieve personal ambitions and goals
- Self-organised, flexible and resilient
- Curious towards new possibilities for creating value
- Responsive to problems and opportunities by making new connections
- Able to go beyond perceived limitations and achieve results
- Tolerant of uncertainty, ambiguity, risk, and failure
- Sensitive to personal values, such as ethical, social, diversity and environmental awareness.

'Students should be encouraged to develop selfawareness of their own enterprising and entrepreneurial capabilities, as well as the motivation and self-discipline to apply these flexibly in different contexts to achieve desired results.

This might include recognising themselves as a person who is creative or resourceful; who can translate ideas into actions; or who is prepared to challenge assumptions through critical investigation and research'.
