



Myers-Briggs Types Inventory





Understanding ourselves helps us to select occupations which are best suited to our personality and lead healthier happier lives.

- ➤ Katharine Cook Briggs and Isabel Briggs Myers extrapolated their MBTI theory from Carl Jung's writings in his 1921 book 'Psychological Types'.
- They began creating their indicator during World War II (1939-1945) in the belief that a knowledge of personality preferences would help women to identify war-time jobs that would be the most comfortable and effective for them.
- ➤ Briggs Myers Type Indicator Handbook, published in 1944, was re-published as 'Myers—Briggs Type Indicator' in 1956.









Story telling - narrative approach








Savickas's six favourite questions are:
